Coastal San Pedro Neighborhood Council Election and Voter Registration

The Coastal San Pedro Neighborhood Council will be holding its annual election on May 20, 2006. As in previous years and in compliance with our bylaws, all 17 Governing Board seats are up for election. In response to requests from civic authorities to clarify our rules, and after deliberation by the Bylaws committee, the Governing Board and CSPNC stakeholders voted to update our Bylaws at the January 2006 meeting. Our previous edition of The Coastal Current contained the updates.

One thing that potential voters should be aware of is the simplification of our definition of who is eligible to vote or to run for the Governing Board.

Under the Los Angeles City Charter, eligibility is automatically conferred on all those who live, work, or own property in this neighborhood council district. In addition, our stakeholders and board added this additional language: "In addition, stakeholder status is conferred by formal membership in a cultural or civic organization that owns

property or occupies, as operator or tenant, a facility at a location in the neighborhood council area which is used primarily for conducting its business or holding its meetings."

Under the election rules that the city has adopted and which are binding on all neighborhood councils, CSPNC will be publishing a detailed list of election rules and procedures, including the location of the polling place and the hours for voting.

Voters will be required to show proof of eligibility at the polling place on election day. For those who live in the district, proof of eligibility can be demonstrated by showing some form of photo ID such as a drivers license or passport. There are other ways of proving residence which will be explained in more detail in the official election procedures. Proof of property ownership is most easily demonstrated by showing a property tax receipt, utility bill, or other documentary evidence. Those who wish to establish eligibility due to membership in a cultural or civic organization may do so by showing some document such as a membership card or receipt for payment of dues.

Under the election rules adopted last year, employment within the district is defined as regular employment at an establishment that has some physical existence within the district. The possibility of future employment within the district was not accepted for purposes of voting eligibility, nor was occasional or irregular employment.
